Secretary Perdue:

It is with great honor that we submit a joint letter of support for the Kansas City area to be chosen as the future home of the USDA Economic Research Service and USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture. As Governors of two states whose economies are deeply linked to both production agriculture and food processing we are thrilled that USDA leadership has proposed the relocation of these two critical agencies. The Midwestern community, and the rural communities that support its future, presents a complete package for USDA and its employees moving forward.

The diversity of agriculture in Kansas and Missouri is nearly unrivaled. Our commodity-based crops of wheat, corn, grain sorghum, rice, cotton and soybeans are an engine of America's agricultural economy. We also produce fruit and other specialty crops in increasing volume and variety to meet the growing demands by consumers for locally-grown products.

It's no secret that both Missouri and Kansas take livestock production seriously — consistently ranking among the top states for production of cattle, hogs, turkeys and chickens.
