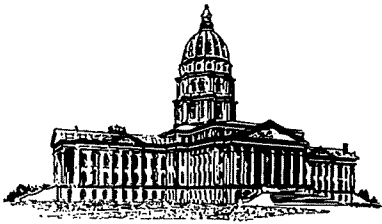

Dear Chairperson Hawkins:

As Chairpersons of the Senate Committee on Utilities and the House Committee on Energy, Utilities and Telecommunications, we request that the Legislative Coordinating Council approve four days during the 2026 Interim for a Special Committee on Energy, Utilities and Telecommunications.

In its study of issues related to energy, utilities, and telecommunications, the Special Committee would seek to review transmission planning by the Southwest Power Pool (SPP), including the 2026 Integrated Transmission Plan and potential high-voltage system enhancements, as well as ongoing cost allocation and regulatory initiatives under consideration by SPP and its stakeholder groups. The Special Committee would evaluate the progression of specific projects and the long-term outlook for Kansas utility infrastructure, including generation, transmission, and system reliability. The topic would include review of investment in natural gas electricity generation in Kansas and across the nation.

The Special Committee would further review developments related to line siting, data centers, and energy storage projects across the state, including associated infrastructure needs and economic impacts, particularly in rural areas. This would involve examining policy considerations for renewable energy siting, such as decommissioning standards, setback requirements, and regulatory oversight from the Kansas Corporation Commission.

The Special Committee would examine advancements in emerging nuclear technologies and their potential applicability in Kansas, grid reliability and the economic considerations of various generation resources within the regional energy market, and opportunities to better align state policy with workforce development and economic development goals in the energy sector. The Special Committee would also evaluate the use of third-party power purchase agreements, including their potential benefits, drawbacks, and related policy considerations.

The work of the Special Committee would include review of energy efficiency initiatives, including current programs and performance metrics. Further review would address the use of bridge fuels and emerging generation technologies, including fuel cells and other distributed

energy solutions to address immediate and short-term power needs and the current use of and long-term outlook for biofuels within Kansas' energy portfolio.

The Special Committee would examine the role, board composition, and statutory duties of the Citizens' Utility Ratepayer Board, as well as review and discuss the application of transmission delivery surcharges. The Committee would also assess the role, capacity, and future needs of public safety answering points and review relevant federal policy changes and updates

The Special Committee would also investigate issues and policy options related to the Kansas Universal Service Fund (Fund) as it pertains to telecommunications. This review would include an overview of the Fund's current administration, its historical intent and evolution, and the impact of recent and anticipated federal policy changes. The Special Committee would examine the role of the Fund in supporting broadband expansion, particularly in rural areas, and evaluate potential modernization options for the Fund.

Finally, the Special Committee would review the structure and distribution of telecommunications-related revenues at the local level, such as franchise fees and similar payments received by municipalities from cable, broadband, and telecommunications providers, in order to better understand statewide trends, fiscal impacts, and potential policy considerations.

Dear Speaker Hawkins & President Masterson,

I am requesting up to 2 days for a Senate Select Committee on Local Elections to study various issues regarding the conduct of local elections, specifically:

- **Local School District Elections.** Currently, Kansas allows school districts to choose between different election models, which can confuse candidates and voters. Before considering reforms, it's important to examine the existing options, how districts can pivot between options, which school districts use which model, and potential ways to modernize or improve the appropriate statutes. Given the matter's complexity, this issue is better suited for in-depth interim study than review during a regular session.
- **Local Government Advocacy in Local Ballot Questions.** This past session, legislation was proposed to regulate how local governments promote their own ballot questions, such as bond issues or sales tax increases. This committee would study reform options and recommend changes to ensure taxpayer funds aren't used for advocacy, allowing Yes and No campaigns on such ballot questions to compete without government tipping the sales. In order to ensure the legislation accomplishes its goals while avoiding unintended consequences, this issue is well-suited for interim study.
- **Advance Voting Calendar.** This past session, legislation proposed changes to election timelines for advance ballots, including when they can be mailed and when in-person advance voting is allowed and/or required. This committee would study potential updates to clarify the impact on election officials and, more importantly, Kansas voters.

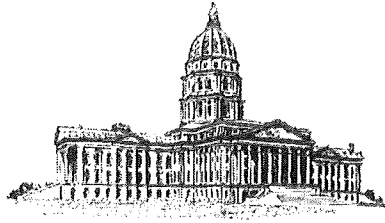

Dear President Masterson and Speaker Hawkins,

I am requesting an interim joint committee meeting to discuss crypto policies for our state. The purpose of the 1 ½ day meeting will be to educate lawmakers, formulate policy, and discuss next steps for our state.

The federal GENIUS Act of 2025 gives states a role in supervising certain stablecoin issuers if they meet federal certification requirements, but it also sets a national baseline for reserve backing, disclosures, and compliance. States that want to participate must build and certify frameworks that match the federal model, which can influence where issuers choose to operate. Why does this matter? Because states with strong, certified frameworks may attract stablecoin issuers seeking a less burdensome environment than federal banking regulators. **Stablecoins will impact Kansas banks and Credit Unions.**

Five years ago, the Kansas Ethics Commission said, “while crypto donations were rare in Kansas, they were “popping up in other places” and the state’s Campaign Finance Act had no provisions for them”. **SB310 would have addressed this issue but didn’t make it out of committee.**

State treasurers across the U.S. have been at the forefront of efforts to bring cryptocurrencies into public finance, often through “strategic bitcoin reserves” or similar legislation. Texas became the first state to purchase Bitcoin via an ETF as part of a state-level strategic reserve and other states like Arizona, Utah, New Hampshire, Ohio, Massachusetts, South Dakota, and Oklahoma have similar crypto investments. **SB352 would have given our state treasurer the opportunity to use unclaimed digital assets to create a digital reserve fund but didn’t make it out of committee.**

Good state policy will enable innovation without overreach.

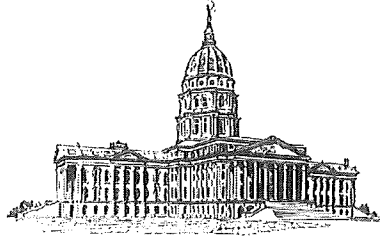

On behalf of the Vehicle Services Modernization Task Force (Task Force) created with enactment of 2026 SB 325, we request one meeting day for the Task Force during the 2026 Interim. SB 325 New Section 1(d)(1) requires the Task Force to meet on or before December 15, 2026.

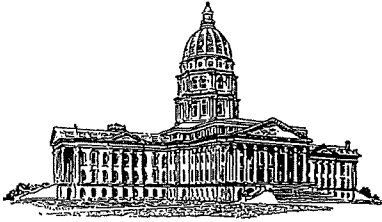

We respectfully request the Legislative Coordinating Council appoint a 2026 Interim Committee on Statutes Regarding Land Adjacent to Cities to examine and make recommendations regarding authority for annexation by cities and law that authorizes a city planning commission to apply city subdivision requirements generally within three miles of city limits (KSA 12-749(a)), and we request three meeting days for that committee.

SB 124, heard in 2026, would have established new limits on unilateral annexation by cities. Both 2025-2026 HB 2025 and SB 37 would have removed statutory authorization for applying city subdivision requirements outside of a city. Our committees heard extensive testimony on HB 2025 and SB 37 and the Senate Committee heard testimony on SB 124 from both proponents and opponents, who provided multiple, thoughtful reasons to both strike and keep current provisions. Our committees requested additional consideration of these matters during the Interim, with opportunity to hear more from proponents, opponents, and neutral conferees and engage in problem-solving discussion for potential statutory change.

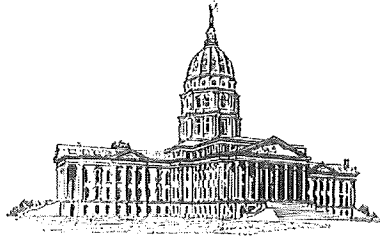

Dear Representative Hawkins:

I write to respectfully request the Legislative Coordinating Council approve two meeting days during the 2026 Interim for a special committee on the 340B Program.

The 340B Drug Pricing Program is a federal initiative overseen by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) between pharmaceutical manufacturers and safety-net healthcare organizations in which the manufactures participating in Medicaid agree to provide outpatient drugs to covered entities at significantly reduced prices.

Multiple studies have been conducted in the U.S. regarding the use of the program and of note is a 2025 study by the National Pharmaceutical Council that found a cost increase to state and local governments as well as a 2025 Commonwealth Fund Explainer noting the significant increase in the number of pharmacy contracts since 2007.

This special committee would review the studies and reports to identify lessons learned and what changes could be implemented at a state level to facilitate the overarching program goal of stretching scarce federal resources to reach more eligible patients and provide more comprehensive services.

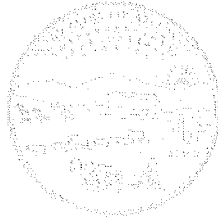

The 340B Drug Pricing Program plays a crucial role in ensuring that providers can stretch scarce resources to serve vulnerable populations. In Kansas, and across this country, rural hospitals, community health centers, and other covered entities rely on 340B savings to maintain essential services and provide access to medications for the uninsured. Recent pharmacy restrictions and manufacturer-imposed limitations have jeopardized the sustainability of the program.

A committee would allow for legislators to hear directly from hospitals, drug manufacturers and patients to better understand the program, the challenges it currently faces and its impact on healthcare access in Kansas. As the Senator representing Cherokee, Crawford and Bourbon county, I've heard firsthand the importance of the 340B program to both providers and patients.

The one day requested will give adequate time for the committee to study the 340B program and make recommendations for the 2027 Legislative Session. Thank you for your consideration of this request.

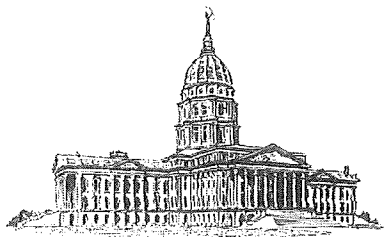

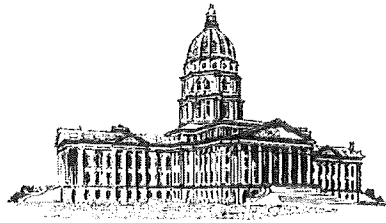

Day 4: Make final edits to the recommended model and finalize recommendations to the 2027 Legislature.

Prior to the four meeting days, members of the Task Force would be encouraged to work on models with staff to allow for the time during the meetings to be focused on the options presented by the Task Force members.

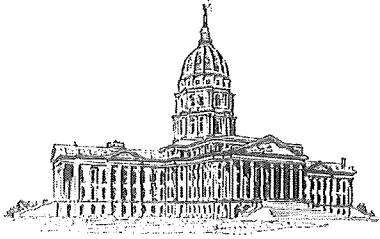

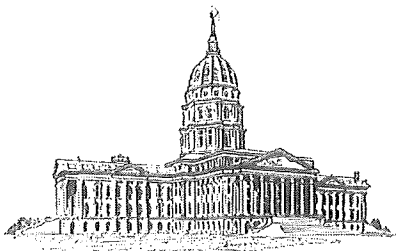
